

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EISTEDDFOD RULES

IT IS IMPORTANT THAT EVERY COMPETITOR & TEACHER READS THESE RULES AND CONDITIONS On entering the Eisteddfod, you will have been deemed to accept these conditions of entry.

General Eisteddfod Rules

- 1. Specific rules must be read in conjunction with these general rules.
- 2. This Eisteddfod is open only to persons whose main income is not derived from the area in which they enter.
- 3. Contestants must be prepared to perform in a Champions concert or Partners event if requested to do so.
- 4. Age of competitor is as at **1st January** of year of competition.
- 5. It is the performer's responsibility to check the program for performance venues, dates and times. Competitors must report to the Marshal on arrival at the Eisteddfod venue.
- 6. Competitors must be present at the **beginning of the session** as withdrawals may alter the order and anticipated time of a performance. It is unwise to anticipate exact performance times.
- 7. Solo competitors may compete only once in any section (unless specifically stated otherwise). Students may perform more than once in duo, trio, quartet but NOT consisting of identical competitors in any one section (unless specifically stated otherwise).
- 8. Groups may compete more than once in any section.
- 9. In all Duo, Trio and Quartet sections, the names of ALL entrants must be on the Entry Form.
- 10. The committee has the right to alter or amend the program in any way at any time, to refuse entry, cancel any entry or cancel any section where entries are insufficient. To enhance competition there must be more than TWO entries in a section. In sections where there is only ONE entry, the competitor will be upgraded to the next age group.
- 11. Competitor numbers must be sufficient before any cash prizes will be awarded in any section. Unless there are at least four competitors in a section, only one prize will be awarded, unless the adjudicator decides otherwise.
- 12. Group entries must be entered in the oldest performer's age group.
- 13. TIME LIMITS for each section MUST be observed. An item may be shorter than the time limit but not exceed it. Competitors will not be adjudicated after the set time has elapsed and may be asked to stop performing after the time limit.
- 14. CENSORSHIP The use of costume, words, subject matter or actions which include suicide or murder that is explicit or of a sexual nature is prohibited as these are regarded as unacceptable in a family environment and will result in the disqualification of the competitor at the adjudicator's discretion. This includes dance and the sexualisation of movements performances must be age appropriate.
- 15. Competitors or teachers, interested parties, or any other persons, must not communicate with the Adjudicator.
- 16. No competitor may perform out of programmed sequence without the approval of the convenor.
- 17. Competitors may bring their own accompanist except where stated otherwise.
- 18. The committee has the right to appoint a substitute Adjudicator and the Adjudicator's decision is final. To be read in conjunction with Rule 25.
- 19. Quota Beenleigh Inc. will not be responsible for copyright and royalty infringements. Please download the Copyright Declaration Form from our website, complete and bring the declaration along with the performance copy, if applicable.
- 20. Mobile phones must be switched off in backstage and dressing room areas at all venues. No cameras allowed in these areas. Mobile phones and other recording devices are prohibited for recording in all venues. BWP Studios allowed.

- 21. All competitors enter the Eisteddfod and take part in the Eisteddfod at their own risk and are responsible for their own belongings.
- 22. Backstage and dressing rooms are to be left in a clean and tidy manner.
- 23. Entry fees are NOT refundable.
- 24. Performers, parents, guardians and teachers are expected to behave in a mature and socially acceptable manner.
- 25. Any protest or objection must be referred to the Convenor within 30 minutes of the Adjudicator's decision. The protest must be submitted by the competitor, teacher or parent and accompanied by a \$50 fee. The fee will be refunded if the claim is found to be valid. The committee reserves the right to request a copy of the competitor's birth certificate if the dispute is age related.
- 26. Teachers are allowed on stage only as accompanists or conductors for choirs or for items requiring stage set-up.
- 27. Only designated teachers and performers are permitted back of house at the Logan Entertainment Centre.
- 28. Failure to comply wholly or partly with any of the rules or conditions may result in disqualification or the withholding of prizes. The decision of the committee on any question or dispute shall be absolutely final. The committee shall decide any matter not covered by the rules or conditions and their decision is final.
- 29. This Eisteddfod is held in a spirit of friendly competition and good sportsmanship. Canvassing by Studio Owners, Teachers, Competitors or Parents to change a competitor's place of enrolment is regarded as bad sportsmanship and will not be tolerated.
- 30. Care will be taken for the safety of all competitors, but the Eisteddfod will not be responsible for any injuries sustained by a competitor or damage to property during the Eisteddfod.
- 31. **PROPS**: Only props that are hand-held and can be taken onto the stage by the competitors are permitted. To be fair to all performers, **props which are larger than hand-held will not be permitted to be used to avoid embarrassment, please do not bring these props to the venue.**
- 32. Only performers, teachers or designated assistants, wearing a performer's or teacher's pass, will be permitted into the backstage area at Logan Entertainment Centre.
- 33. Competitor's passes are compulsory for each performer and must be purchased at the time of entry

Specific Rules for Speech & Drama

- 1. Please read the General Eisteddfod Rules carefully before reading these Specific Rules
- 2. Performance material including any music must be uploaded using Music Uploads you will be advised when the upload is available for the Eisteddfod. No other form of performance material will be accepted.
- 3. Please bring a back-up on a USB or smart device in the rare case there is a problem with the music.
- 4. It is your responsibility to check that the material is correct after uploading.
- 5. A copy of "Own Choice" pieces we expect these will be uploaded via Music Uploads.
- 6. A performance piece may not be used more than once by the same person.
- 7. Improvisations should include both mime and speech.
- 8. A competitor may participate in more than one scene or extract.
- 9. Teachers are not allowed on stage. All prompting to be done by the adjudicator, except in Extracts from a playlet.
- 10. A copy of Scenes and Extract from a Playlist and cast lists to be performed must be emailed to <u>drama@quotabeenleigh.org.au</u> or posted to the convenor at least one week before performance.

MUSIC UPLOADS

The Eisteddfod is using Music Uploads to manage the *performance pieces* and voice critiques – this approach is a great way to streamline the processes to ensure longevity of the Eisteddfod.

This means that you do not need to bring *paper files for performance pieces*. All performance material is uploaded and available for the Adjudicator to be played from a central computer.

We do recommend that you always have a back-up of your files on your phone or tablet in case there is any technology issues.

Please note that studio accounts are not for adding solo performers. Parents will need to create an account and upload performance pieces for solo performers.

Step 1 – View the Music Uploads Videos - Music Uploads YouTube Channel

Step 2 – Create an Account (if you do not already have one) or Reactivate your Account (if you have previously used Music Uploads).

Step 3 – Add the Region (Competition) – you will need to pay for each competition you add.

Step 4 – Upload Files to Storage

Step 5 – Transfer the Files to the Region (Competition)

Step 6 – Create or Search for a Performer and review that all entries are correct.

Step 7 – Transfer the files for the Performer

Step 8 - **Check your Files** – ensure it is the correct music and that a document file has all pages the correct way up.


Step 9 – If you wish to **withdraw** an entry, please use that option in Music Uploads and our team will be notified.

Music Uploads will be ready for you to transfer your files by 8th July and the cut-off date will be 20th August – there will be no extensions beyond that date as we need to have the files ready for the start of performances on 26th August.

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DEFINITION OF DRAMA STYLES

PROSE

A selection taken from a novel. Usually, an excerpt contains direct and indirect speech as well narration. This gives the competitor an opportunity to use character voices as well as tell the story.

CHARACTER PERFORMANCE IN COSTUME

A monologue taken from a published play or book of actor's scenes, memorized and acted by the competitor.

DRAMA SELECTION

A monologue taken from a published play memorized and acted by the competitor.

MONOLOGUE


A monologue is a scene where only one character speaks. The *other character listens*.... you're going to imagine that other character standing in front of you.

STANDARD WORK

A published or well-known text.

ASK THE EXPERT

A combination of speech and impromptu talking. Competitors prepare and present a speech about a hobby or area of interest and are then required to answer adjudicator questions.

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
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ADJUDICATOR

Competitor passes **cover the whole drama eisteddfod**. Passes are in the form of a participant's ribbon and can be collected at the Eisteddfod. Competitor passes are purchased through Comps Online when doing your entry.

Downloadable programs are compulsory and will be added to each entry on Comps Online.

Printed programs will be mailed – these are optional and can be purchased on Comps Online.

Teachers' Passes

Complimentary teachers' passes can be collected at the Eisteddfod from the Quota desk and must be returned when leaving the venue.

CLOSING DATES

Closing Date for entries is 1st June 2024.

Late Closing for entries is **8**th **June 2024** – entries between 1st June and 8th June will incur late fees of \$27.50.

Music Uploads will be available from **8**th **July to 20**th **August** – no extensions beyond this date will be available as we need to have all music downloaded ready for performances commencing on 26th August.

Once the late entry period has closed on 8th June 2024 on Comps Online. No further entries will be accepted.

LATE ENTRIES

A once-off late fee of \$27.50 will be applied on all entries on Comps Online received after the closing date of 1st June and the late entry closing date of 8th June 2024.

CHANGES TO ENTRIES

We ask that you please check your entries are correct at the time of entry. Making changes is very time consuming for our convenors. This year, any **changes made after the closing date** will incur a \$22 fee for each change. This will be invoiced, and the changes will be made after payment has been received.
